THE PEW HISPANIC CENTER: JULY 1, 2001 – JULY 1, 2007

The center uses the tools of social science research to improve understanding of the diverse Hispanic experience in the United States and to chronicle Latinos' growing impact on the nation. Founded as a project of the University of Southern California Annenberg School for Communication, it has been a project of the Pew Research Center since September 2004.

FOUNDER AND DIRECTOR

--Research and publications

Supervised staff of eight persons, including four PhD scholars, and directed commissioned work by outside researchers.

Editor-in-chief for all publications and Web site content, including 69 research reports, 28 fact sheets, 6 datasets and 2 statistical portraits, utilizing original public opinion surveys and secondary analysis of data from a variety of sources including the decennial census, the Current Population Survey, the Survey of Income and Program Participation, the American Community Survey and the National Education Longitudinal Survey. Author or co-author of 24 research reports (listed below).

--Surveys

Designed sampling strategies, directed questionnaire development and supervised statistical analysis and report production. The Center has conducted 19 public opinion surveys with samples ranging from 500 to more than 5,000 respondents (listed below).

Collaborated in the development of a disproportionate stratified Random Digit Dialing (RDD) sampling technique that stratifies telephone exchanges in a target area by concentration of Hispanic households and that thus enables the cost-effective use of RDD sampling of the entire target population including respondents in low-concentration communities. Supervised the development of a national origins sample allocation methodology to draw robust samples of Hispanics of non-Mexican origins with RDD sampling.

Designed and supervised an intercept survey of some 4,800 Mexicans interviewed in the process of applying for consular identity cards that was conducted in seven Mexican consulates around the country to produce detailed data on recently arrived and undocumented Mexican migrants (2004-2005).

Principal investigator of a project funded by the U.S. Census Bureau to develop an interactive Web site for user-designed reports based on the American Community Survey (ACS) and to research and write profiles of major racial and ethnic groups based on ACS data (2005-2006).

Principal investigator on a grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to design and execute a multiyear series of surveys exploring a variety of health issues in the Hispanic population. The project aimed first to produce new and important findings on the extent to which different segments of the Latino population vary in their knowledge of health risks and their perceptions of health care options. Second, the project set out to demonstrate the need for more extensive collection of demographic variables about immigrant-stock populations in the large scale health surveys conducted by the National Institutes of Health, the Centers for Disease Control and other government agencies (2006-2008).

Responsible for dissemination of the Center's research products through publications, conferences, public speaking engagements, news media contacts and briefings for policy makers. The Center was cited in more than 2,000 articles in major U.S. newspapers, including more than 100 each in *The Washington Post*, *The New York Times* and *The Los Angeles Times*. Regular appearances on television network news broadcasts and National Public Radio. Responsible for coordinating public appearances by senior staff which averaged in excess of 50 a year. Conducted regular briefings for senior staff in Congress and the executive branch. Survey databases distributed to an online community of 3,000 researchers
